

F YOU REMEMBER the hevday of nightly 75 meter rag-chew nets, and the weekly 20 meter gettogethers of old friends scattered across the country, you're showing your age. Back in those halcyon days, hamsgentlemen all—made it a point to be polite to each other, and took turns making meaningful transmissions to the other hams in their groups. One oft-used format for these informal nets was the "roundtable" net, where each participant spoke his or her comments and then passed it around to the next station on the list.

Sadly, this tradition seems to have fallen by the wayside, and at times our bands sound like a bunch of mean, bitter old men jealously guarding "their" frequency like dogs in a manger, and refusing to make a contact with anyone they don't know, even though they really have nothing to talk about with their group. On the VHF FM channels, very few meaningful contacts are heard. The norm on the repeater channels is endless phonetic repetition of callsigns and



Building A UniCounter

BOUT A MONTH after I retired there was a link to a web site on the Internet that caught my eve. It was an advertisement for a frequency counter that could also be used for a digital dial. At the time I was working on a Ramsey Kit for a QRP rig

and thought it might be a good idea to add a digital display. In keeping with the small physical size of the rig I wanted something equally small for the display. The UniCounter fit the bill.

Much of the circuitry of the counter is the same as any other frequency counter. The major difference is that it uses a single seven segment LED digit for the readout. I'd seen that concept used before in a digital clock kit from White Rook kits so understood the idea. In the case of the clock kit the single digit was a just a gimmick. But interesting nevertheless. In this case the idea was to make the counter

operator to read the frequency one digit front of them. There is obviously a slight at a time.

The kit came with three pages of instructions that are nearly as good as the old Heathkit assembly manuals. Ron KA3J did his homework with the technical writing so the sequence for parts placement are easy. The programming of the counter is a bit more complicated. It uses an "offset number" that converts the raw input number to the actual number I wish to display. For example, the Kenwood TS-520 transceiver uses a VFO frequency of 5 to 5.5 MHz. The band switch tells the radio to convert that VFO frequency to 3.990 MHz for the daily Rooster Net at 6 AM. Since the Kenwood has 5 bands the counter would require 5 programmed offset frequencies, one for each band. This would be for use as a digital dial for the radio that has only a rotary dial.

The other nice touch is that the counter uses an LED digit instead of a liquid Those crystal display. gray-on-gray


as small as possible and force the to read especially if I'm not squarely in increase in total current draw using the LED instead of the LQ display but I feel that it's worth it.

> Assembly is easy with all the parts pushed through holes in the circuit board. The single IC chip has a socket that is soldered to the board. The LED digit is soldered directly to the board but could be socketed as well if you choose. The various caps and resistors are also easy to install as there is plenty of room between parts. Just take your time and use a <75 watt iron with a fairly small tip. External parts are the 9-volt battery snaps, three wires for the "jumper" select and the push button that inputs commands to the PIC chip.

> At first I was going to build the counter into the same chassis as the ORP rig. On further reflection I decided to mount the counter in a separate box so it could be used for other projects. Some RC radio servos are packages in small plastic cases that will hold both the battery and counter

> > board. I will mount it that way and enjoy the added benefit of being able to show off the innards of the counter to interested people.

> > mentioned earlier, the counter can act as standalone frequency counter where no offset frequency is needed. It can also act as a digital dial for a receiver or transmitter and programmed to various bands. If that is the case then 9-volt power could be derived from the host radio to eliminate the need for the battery. In either use the counter offers 8-digit numbers that can produce 10 Hertz resolution. A provision is also added that allows the operator



I was building a QRP rig and thought I would add a digital display

to determine a frequency error and program the display to compensate for it. Finally, the speed at which the single digit switches from one number to the next can be programmed from 100 to 500 ms in 9 steps so you don't have to be a "speed reader".

Frequency counters and digital displays in kit form are available via the Internet. If you Google for N3ZI his web page comes

up and details a variety of digital displays, counters and VFO kits. Two of these operating now in TS-520 rigs here and at the QTH of N3NWL. The basic electronics are the same for both the N3ZI kits and the Uni Counter. Only the method of display is different. I like the N3ZI kits but they use the liquid crydisplay. stal The UniCounter shines because its red LED digit is really easy to read. Otherwise they are very similar.

If you have a need for a frequency counter or want to add a

digital display to a project this kit should be considered. The fun factor alone makes it worth the effort!







Repeater Report

Pete Carr WW30

HE NEW REPEATER is installed at the Ridgway radio site. It's the Hamtronics unit with a duplexer and 4-pole antenna at 45 feet. The operating frequency is 443.800 MHz with a 5 MHz positive offset. I repaired the 20+ year old repeater while Rick N3RJH obtained and tuned the duplexer.

The immediate goal is to use the repeater in it's present location for a couple weeks

to shake the bugs out of it. If all goes well we intend to move it to St. Marys and install it to give HT coverage from any part of town. Then, as time permits we want to install a radio link that would allow users of the repeater to go through it and check into the Sunday night net on 147.00 MHz.

I'd like to ask that club members who have UHF radios try the new repeater and send me a signal report. The repeater is running without a preamp so I will get one on order and ask again for signal reports whenever it arrives and is installed. Most repeaters do benefit from a preamp but sometimes it adds to the noise level. This test will decide if the preamp helps the received signal.

The new 443.800 repeater is presently at the Ridgway radio site. We want to



relocate it to St. Marys where it will offer handheld coverage all over town. The initial location was to shake out the bugs. It was a good idea because the 12 volt power supply lasted 4 days and then quit.

The long skinny box on the bottom is the actual repeater. On top of that is a small duplexer that keeps transmit signals from getting into the receiver. Above that is the power supply that runs the entire station. On the right is a small black box which is the receiver preamplifier. That helps replace the duplexer signal loss and extends the repeater operational range.

We have a UHF antenna, connectors and enough coax cable to mount the antenna in a good high location. What we need is a location. The antenna pattern would work really well from somewhere out south on RT-255 toward Red Hill Summit. Alternately we could place the unit on Rt-120 to the east toward Getz Summit shooting southwest. 
